"because they realize it's not right to not cover it. Building a family is not elective. It's essential for most of us. It's a very important part of life.

"And with Invocell, the hope is that we can minimize some of that extra work, so that it becomes cheaper—it becomes more cost effective for the patient," he said.

Foulk said he's been using Invocell in his Salt Lake City and Las Vegas practices for almost nine months now and has been pleased with several resulting pregnancies. "Their Fallopian tubes don't work well. What IVF is for, essentially, is to bypass what normally happens in the Fallopian tube. And normally fertilization happens in the distal Fallopian tube."

In cases where a couples' problems are different—say if sperm are unable to fertilize eggs on their own—Invocell is not a viable

solution and different forms of IVF need to be considered.

"But it still gives us an alternative for a lot of folks that could otherwise not be able to afford it or just want a more natural way to let the process unfold," Foulk said. "It's very good for a group of people—and it's usually the younger folks that tend to be struggling more financially. They're not as set in there jobs and such, and those are the ones it helps most. So it's directed

> toward those that need it the most."


